## Statement by **H.E. Alexander Schallenberg**

## Federal Minister for European and International Affairs of the Republic of Austria

at the

**International Conference on Nuclear Security: Sustaining and Strengthening Efforts** 

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Mr. President,
Director General,
Excellencies,
Ladies and Gentlemen,

Let me begin by extending, on behalf of the host country, a **heartfelt welcome** to all of you to this **international conference** here **in Vienna**.

This is the third gathering on nuclear security. The growing attendance highlights the importance of the work of the IAEA in general and nuclear security, in particular for all states, including Austria.

It is no secret that we are currently facing many challenges concerning nuclear security!

**Three** of these are from our point of view a particularly big concern.

**First** there is the role of **non-state actors**, who play a big part not just in **conflicts** today. We know that some of them seek to **acquire and deploy weapons of mass destruction**.

The **consequences** of such indiscriminate attacks, including "**dirty bombs**" that carry radioactive material, would be **devastating**.

This threat does not respect national borders!

To tackle it, we must increase international efforts to strengthen nuclear security.

Second: nuclear weapons.

They pose a big danger to us and it is clear that these weapons threaten life on earth!

But instead of being decommissioned and destroyed, nuclear arsenals are being **upgraded for hundreds of billions of dollars.** 

So that they will stay in service for **decades** and may become **even more lethal**.

The **diplomatic achievements** we have made and the **international organizations** created to foster **peace** and **cooperation are being called into question** by the words and actions of several states.

An alarming development. As we all know that **nuclear policy of deterrence** cannot bring security.

This is why Austria clearly supports the goal of a nuclear weapon-free world and the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons. We will raise our voice until the last one of these weapons is gone.

The third challenge, Ladies and Gentlemen, concerns nuclear power.

Since the **Chernobyl accident** in 1986 a lot has been done to **minimise the safety risks** of nuclear generation of energy.

The IAEA has done excellent work on this and we appreciate this very highly.

But despite of all efforts, the disaster of **Fukushima** in 2011 proved once more that **there is no such thing as complete safety!** 

Especially as nuclear reactors face many security risks as environmental disasters, cyberattacks or acts of terrorism.

The consequences of any incident reach far beyond the borders of the concerning state.

This is why we need **cooperation**, **safeguards**, **standards** and **regulations** on an international level within the **framework of the Agency**.

Austria decided not to produce nuclear power at all. A precaution that is enshrined in our constitution. We hope that many more will join us.

Ladies and Gentlemen!

Let me finish by reiterating that **Austria will always fully support the Agency's work**, especially on nuclear security.

This week we will have an opportunity to enhance the security of all states.

Not only for our today's world but also for the safety of many future generations!
