## first results of inis

The International Nuclear Information System (INIS) set up co-operatively by the Agency and its Member States to improve identification and availability of information relating to nuclear science and its peaceful applications has begun its work. The first result was the first number of the first volume of INIS Atomindex, produced in May this year.

For various reasons the first number of INIS Atomindex, which is only one product of the first processing cycle of the system, is comparatively slim, though it contains 147 references listed under subjects, and indexed for authors, report numbers and corporate entries. The cycle was initiated at the Agency on 1 April 1970 and involved only those records received in Vienna by that date. Unfortunately there were postal delays due to European holidays immediately beforehand, preventing the arrival of much of the material submitted for input by Member States. The effect was that the first processing cycle was carried out with input only from the Agency itself and two Member States. That which arrived late will be dealt with in the second cycle and reported in the second issue of INIS Atomindex.

During the remainder of 1970 the index will be issued once each month, and its entries will be cumulated at the end of the year.

The second has already appeared and the third was well advanced at the time of going to press.

For the operation of INIS the Member States, together with those international and regional institutions which are collaborating, scan scientific and technical literature and report the input data for INIS to the Agency. The Agency processes what is received, merges it and issues four services:

A magnetic tape service, available only to participating governments and organizations;

INIS Atomindex, produced directly by computer from the magnetic tapes (available to the public; subscription US \$20 for 1970, including indexes);

Abstracts on microfiche — an abstract for every item reported in the magnetic tape service and in INIS Atomindex (available to the public, subscription US \$45 for 1970); and

Full texts of "non-conventional literature", consisting of all items other than journal articles and commercially published books (available to the public; standing orders US \$0.20 per microfiche, individual orders US \$0.65 per document irrespective of the number of microfiches contained in the document.

Individual orders for the microfiche copies of full texts must be paid for in advance, either in cash, in UNESCO book coupons or with IAEA microfiche service coupons. The latter may be obtained in books of fifty at a cost of US \$32.50 or the equivalent in currency in any of the countries in which the Agency has a bank account. Orders should be sent to INIS Section at the Agency address; enquiries or suggestions will be welcomed by the Director, Division of Scientific and Technical Information.
